Comparing these figures with those of 1886 it is seen that the attendance has remained almost the same, the increase being very slight. Indeed, the average attendance of members at meetings has only increased from 9 during the first year of the Society to 10.6 during the past year. Through the kindness of the Director of the U. S. Geological Survey, Mr. S. F. Emmons has been permitted to deposit temporarily in the Museum of the Society a systematic collection of eruptive rocks from the Leadville, Ten Mile, Silver Cliff and Gunnison regions. This collection embraces about 760 hand specimens properly labelled and arranged for inspection.

The Museum has been further enriched by the very valuable suite of rare copper arsenates from Tintic District, Utah, deposited by Mr. Richard Pearce.
